



Taking the time to view and study works of art beyond our cultural society often becomes very fulfilling.

Following the closure of our member's winter exhibition in June it was time to notify members of activities at the Society during July. The ever popular student teacher exhibition displayed a large number of entries again this year. Thank you to the sponsors for their support providing awards that were presented to the worthy winners. Over the past three years the VAS student\teachers exhibition has been displayed on the Open House Weekend. With good quality and well-priced works the weekend resulted in excellent sales.

Thank you also to the tutors for entering examples of their work, with a number of their paintings being sold.

Open House Melbourne Weekend attracts up to 1,500 visitors to the galleries each year. The society was very proud to host this event again this year, introducing the public to

our building.

Member activity for August involved our Portrait painters. Starting with the wonderful portrait exhibition. Congratulations to exhibiting artists, this was an exhibition of a very high standard. The quality of work made it an exciting and pleasing exhibition to view.

During this exhibition on Sunday the 26th August we also held our annual "Portrait Painters in Action" day. This is a day for portrait painters to paint in the galleries and enjoy the company of other portrait artists. With professional sitters arranged for the day and artists bringing their own painting kit this gave the day a very relaxed atmosphere. It truly was a day for portrait painters and enjoyed by all, with a request to repeat the day in the future.

The Spring select exhibition backed up very quickly after Greg Smith's annual exhibition in September. Greg is a master of his craft and his exhibitions never fail to please the viewer. Congratulations to Greg for his consistent work presentation and sales.

The spring exhibition was the third select exhibition for the year. Our Members votes for artists exhibiting in the three select exhibitions go towards Artist of the Year.

This was a wonderful exhibition with a great opening night enjoyed by artists friends and families. Colin Johnson our invited judge had an expert eye and awardees appreciated the critique of each painting upon presentation of their Award.

Thursday the 6th September we signed the contract with our chosen builder MANCON for the next stage of restoration. As you will all have noticed work is now underway.

Stage one for the builders was the installation of the temporary toilet block and the demolition of the old toilet block, storerooms, studio and kitchen making these areas ready for redevelopment, which will also include the lift shaft.

A loft like storeroom above the toilets opening onto the McCubbin Gallery is also in the plan.

The decision was made to close the studio until the end of the term three, for health and safety reasons. This will have some restrictions on class numbers as we will use the Cato Gallery as a substitute studio. Thank you to all for being understanding while this work is being carried out.

Restoration Program

The restoration program is going well. However, predictably, a number of problems have been encountered with the building. Mainly caused by its age.

Whilst the problems have been challenging, we are determined to see them through.

To summarise, the challenges we have faced so far are as follows.

- At the very beginning the roof was leaking. More water over-flowed inside the building than outside. We had to make the building waterproof. As we undertook this it quickly became obvious that the building was at an early stage of decay.
- Following replacement of the roof and rainheads, we restored the upper galleries.

This included insulation, rewiring and heating and the floors were re-sanded and sealed.

 But most important of all, the arches were re-claimed and the balcony restored. To add icing to the cake, completely new lighting was installed.

Then, in no order of importance, unexpected problems were encountered.

- 1. All water coming into the building was drawn from the fire hydrant. To add insult to injury, the water was drawn along a rusty galvanised pipe which was about to burst. It crumbled as soon as it was touched.
- 2. The storm water drains were totally blocked, apparently and had been for some time.
- 3. Sewerage was backing up. It was about at the trigger point.
- 4. In the studio live wires were embedded in the ceiling. An absolute time bomb.

- 5. Insulation in the studio was a health hazard.
- 6. The mechanical fan in the studio / kitchen had never been serviced, was full of dust, and a health hazard.
- 7. The wall between the kitchen and the studio had to be replaced. It appeared as though it had originally been built by a working bee of a few members.
- 8. When removing the wall between the kitchen and the studio a painting was discovered. It was unsigned, and attempts are currently being made to address its origin. There is a feeling it was painted in the 1940's.
- 9. Over many years the sink in the studio refused to drain. When replacing the sink it was discovered that 14 paint brushes were stuck in the downpipe. No wonder Drano was

unable to solve the problem.

10. In and around the ladies' toilet the floor joists were rotting.

We now believe that the previously unknown problems have been identified.

However, it is worth noting that the Victorian Artists Society has a definite obligation to maintain the property. Not doing so would create a breach of the arrangement with the Crown who could then take possession of the property. In closing, we have been carefully monitoring our money spent, together with our forward financial commitments. We have raised over \$1,600,000, a total of which we can all be proud.

It seems we will need a further \$300,000 to finish the project. This will be scoped when the lift, toilets, studio and kitchen are completed. The scope of the balance will include the façade, automatic doors at entry, office upgrade, rewiring and painting.

I am sure everyone agrees that the

restoration of the building deserves to be completed in its totality.

The future of the Society lies in the hands of the members and old friends. Thank you to those who have contributed to the restoration to date. However I would be extremely grateful if those who are able to contribute a little more, would consider doing so enabling us to take the final step.



With a gloomy start to the day and a biting breeze only seven of us turned out. We were glad to feel the sun breaking through later in the morning. The Gardens were suddenly bathed in sunshine presenting us with brilliant highlights of various greens contrasting with deep blue shadows.

"I love seeing painters with their easels set up out here. It brings back such lovely memories," she said. "In fact, I remember him painting in this exact spot. The same scene you are... His name was Ernest Buckmaster. Have you heard of him?"

I thought it a remarkable coincidence to meet, on a quiet little side road in Gembrook, the daughter of one of our most prominent past members.

September Inverloch

For our September 4 day trip away, we returned to Inverloch. A total of 26 attended over the 4 days

The first two days were beautiful and sunny, although windy. We started our painting on the Inverloch foreshore and the following day went to Kilcunda, with its well-known and oft painted trestle rail bridge and clifftop ocean views. Just a minute or so inland from here there are rural views of the undulating dairy country typical of South Gippsland.

The group spread out to a number of vantage points all within a short distance of each other to capture the spectacular Bass Coast scenery. The day was bright and the salt spray whipped up by the strong southwesterly winds accentuated the blue haze over the cliffs as they receded into the distance. It's such a beautiful place to paint.

On Saturday our plan had been to head across to Venus Bay but nature threw us a complete contrast to the previous days. A fierce day of gale force winds, horizontal rain and hail at times and dark threatening clouds with dazzling bleached white sunlight breaking through between them.

With the conditions being so wild, a flurry of text messages between group members advised plans had changed to "every man for himself".... or herself, as the case may be!

VAS Paintouts

The sensible ones in the group took shelter in various cafes around the area, went for a sightseeing drive or stayed at the motel. The unhinged few amongst us persevered on the lee side of the Venus Bay peninsula overlooking Andersons Inlet.

Our last day was much calmer and our stop off site before the return home was Archies Creek. The once thriving little town nestles between rolling green hills and presents a mixed collection of buildings including a long-abandoned dairy and a butter factory dating from the early 1900's.

These had once employed over two hundred people but Archies Creeks heydays passed and the factories closed down in 1983

Our stay at Inverloch was a mixed bag of conditions, but all who went seemed to enjoy the variety and we were able to get in some satisfying painting and time together. And that's what it's all about!

This year in October John held his second VAS solo exhibition in the Hammond and McCubbin galleries upstairs.


John had an impressive 107 artworks


